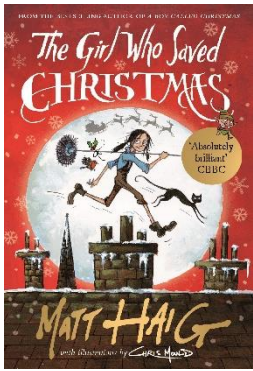




Dear Parents and Carers,

After three weeks away from school, it was a joy to get back this week after recovering from surgery and feel back at home with the staff and children. Whilst I have been keeping up with emails and news as well as seeing everyone in our weekly Bench of Glory, it's just not the same!



For our final fortnight, the whole school is working on the same timetable and theme. We are basing our work on the Matt Haig book, *The Girl who Saved Christmas*. On **Thursday 17th** afternoon the whole school is going TO THE PANTOMIME! (Oh, yes we are!) The Price Waterhouse company (courtesy of Mrs Razzell) had invited us to go to the theatre, but as we can't go to the theatre, the theatre is coming to us! We are all going to share 'Sleeping Beauty' together on the afternoon of **Thursday 17th** filmed live from the Theatre Royal and invite you to send your child with change of clothes if they would like to get dressed up for the experience! Anything pantomime ... a party outfit or a princess dress would be perfect – it's your choice! During the last 6 days we will be marking Christmas with a candlelit celebration of story and music for each year group in the hall. You will have heard or read in the media that the government announced on Tuesday that schools could choose to redirect one of their inset days to Friday 18th December. This is not an 'additional inset day' and, controversially, comes with too little notice and without great purpose. Whilst it primarily means that a headteacher would not have to be 'on call' to respond to COVID related issues on Christmas Eve, it offers no greater last minute benefit and potentially gives working parents and families childcare issues both now and in July when we would have to alter our end of year plans. Our current arrangement of breaking up on Friday 18th December stands.

This term has been both unusual and demanding. Whilst we have temporarily had to make the best of such a limited life, we continue to work hard to provide as broad a curriculum and school experience as the rules allow. I am grateful for your understanding during what we hope will be a short-lived period, and your words of encouragement together with the wonderful way that your children have adapted and coped in a narrowed world has been admirable. It is not normal. It is limited. It can often be frustrating. There are no assemblies, mixing of classes, group work or team teaching projects... BUT as we meet 2021, I hope that there will be a sense of optimism. Many schools have faced unprecedented teacher absence and frequent episodes of class isolation and extended home-learning. I would like to publicly thank the Willow staff team for their sheer determination and loyalty this term. Their frustration is often as great as yours but I assure you that there is not a single one who would not put their commitment to your children first. I imagine there are not many headteachers who are able to say that, and I am grateful.

Thank you too, for your compliance with our request that you wear face masks in our communal areas. This can only add to our collective wellbeing and I respectfully ask that you continue to do so.
