Thought 1

Which of the answers to these questions did you think was most obvious?

Mr Jones says "I thought that question 7 was the most obvious because everyone knows that it isn't usually a good idea to meet people in real life who you have only met off the internet. You should always check with your parents. This has been the message teachers have given you ever since I first heard of internet safety day!"

Mrs Smith says "I think that the questions where you are dealing with strangers were the most obvious. If you haven't met someone in real life before, you should always be careful".

Thought 2

Which of the answers to these questions did you think was most surprising?

Mr Jones says "I thought that question 8 was the most surprising. It's the one about entering an online competition. I suppose I thought the advice would be to NEVER enter an online competition. I think that's just because I don't really enter competitions like that. But there are lots of people who find that kind of thing fun. You just have to weigh up your chances of winning to see if you think it's worth it.

Mrs Smith says "your chances of winning are so small that it's just not much fun".

Which of these situations have you found yourself in already?

Mr Jones says "I think I've been in nearly all of these situations before. I sometimes get cross when I see other people have shared something that is unkind and untrue. I have to resist temptation to point out the truth to these people because I know it will just cause an argument.

Mrs Smith says "I might fall into the trap of doing loads of research online to try and find out if something is factually correct or not. I should just not worry about it and spend time reading my book or doing something positive instead".
