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Dear Parents and Carers,

With the Platinum Jubilee celebrations only three weeks away, Willow Brook's summer term has, unsurprisingly, got off to a very royal start! Lessons and assemblies have been filled with facts and traditions, and the children are already proving that their knowledge of London and the Queen is growing at a pace.

This week our Year 6 children focus on their SATs tests. They have worked so hard during their time with Mr. Jones, and with the added wisdom of Mrs Armitage and Mr Magner, they are prepared and ready. This morning's Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling test was suitably challenging but there was nothing that they hadn't met... not even those past progressive/third person form of the subjunctive verb tenses!

When parents and carers ask what they can do to help their children achieve at primary school, there is just one answer that is guaranteed to make a difference... reading! Getting into the habit at an early age of listening to them read every day, enjoying a bedtime story and helping your child to understand that good books are the key to making sense of what they see, hear and think is worth its weight in gold. What's more, there is no greater pleasure than sharing that experience with them. Our *Race to Waterstones Challenge* was designed to reinforce and encourage such reading habits. Today the race was won by our Year 6 class with a resounding 100% of children sharing a book with an adult at home on at least three occasions over the past week. Their reward, as promised, is a trip to Waterstones! They will have a super morning with the staff in the children's department who have a few treats to share. They will also get a healthy budget to buy a new library of fiction books for the school. I have a feeling that they will leave the Year 6 classroom well stocked for next year's children... Whilst the official race is over, *please* keep reading! It is everything that you need to do to make sure that your child will be ready and able when it comes to their turn to meet a SATs paper!

On Friday we re-start rehearsals for Peter Pan. We are hoping that our hard work from the autumn term will slot back into place, and, with a slightly shorter script, we will be ready to perform on 21<sup>st</sup>, 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> June. It is an action-packed term, but we are determined!

**After half term we are reverting to a 3.30pm finish for the whole school.** Now that people are starting to feel more comfortable in larger gatherings, we feel it would be the most sensible option. We trust that those who continue to take a more cautious approach to social situations will have the space to feel welcome and safe. We also hope that this notice gives you enough time to plan any adjustments. In the meantime, we would kindly ask that you remind your children not to jump over the bow or stern of the pirate ship. They know that this is the rule at playtimes and understand that as well as guarding against broken limbs, the presence of a nine-legged octopus and a shark mean that you should keep your wits about you. It's something that they tend to forget when they are in the playground without us!

On a final note, please can I remind you as we head to warmer weeks in school that our school uniform policy details that children should wear tailored grey or black shorts. Children should not wear walking boots or trainers. We do all that we can to keep our uniform simple and affordable and would be more than happy to offer financial support if it is needed in any way.
